Restoring a Salt Marsh



September 2009: The restoration of Gooseneck Cove has brought life back to a salt marsh. In addition to the wildlife, people (walkers, bikers, birders, kayakers, fishermen) are enjoying the improved Cove .



June 2009: Wildlife returns to the marsh including osprey, coyote, deer, snapping turtles, blue crabs and this great egret.



May 2009: After construction was complete, biology students from Rogers High School planted *Spartina alterniflora*, a native salt marsh cordgrass, along the banks of Hazard Road.



April 6, 2009: The Ocean Drive culvert has been installed beneath Hazard Road.



March 24, 2009 - Prep work has occurred at Ocean Drive to prepare for the installation of the three new culverts under the road. The pavement has been removed and temporary dams around the construction area have been created on either side of the road. These areas will be continually pumped free of water to allow for construction.



February 25, 2009: The Hazard Rd. culvert has been installed and opened up, and the road subbase has been laid down.



February 2009: Wooden forms are built for the concrete base which will support the culvert on Hazard Rd. The concrete was poured the afternoon of February 12, and the culvert was installed on Friday, February 13.



February 12, 2009: The dam at Gooseneck Cove is completely gone!



January 26, 2009: Northern Construction Service removes the central dam from Gooseneck Cove.
